## United Health Foundation and Children's National Hospital: Partnering to Improve Health in Washington, D.C.

Children's National Hospital, based in Washington, D.C., was established in 1870 and is one of the top five children's hospitals in the nation today. Serving children across D.C., Maryland and Virginia, Children's National is transforming pediatric medicine for all children and developing new and better ways to care for kids.

Recognizing that school-aged children in Washington, D.C.'s most underresourced communities face barriers to health care access, the United Health Foundation, the philanthropic arm of UnitedHealth Group, and Children's National began a multi-year, \$3.4 million grant partnership in 2021. The grant enables a unique program that brings together a team of school nurses, community health workers and mobile medical services to identify and close gaps in health care. The communities served by this program face some of the most significant health challenges in the region, including high rates of child poverty, asthma, obesity, school absenteeism and more.
